Saturday, 5 September 2026

Field trip. Departure from Budapest at 8 a.m. by private bus. Estimated costs: 65–70 euros per person (excluding dinner). Scheduled stops:

- **Kecskemét and its surroundings** – Truth spots in the countryside: Field observations of Great Plain agricultural towns as products of a unique trajectory of urban development in rural Hungary. What has happened since the region's Ottoman conquest in the 16th century and why does that matter for the history of human geography as an academic discipline in Hungary?
- **Tiszaföldvár** – The institutional infrastructure of geographical knowledge production beyond universities and research institutes: How can countryside museums contribute in the 21st century? Case study: Tiszazug Geographical Museum, Hungary's oldest geographical museum (founded in 1956) and the 2026 winner of the Museum of the Year in Hungary award in the town of Tiszaföldvár
- **Szarvas** – What happens before entering the university gate? Shedding new light on pre-tertiary education's less discussed impact on leading geographers' scientific careers. Case study: Tibor Mendöl, the interwar pioneer of urban geography in Hungary, and his secondary school years in the town of Szarvas

Getting There

By Air

The nearest airport is **Budapest Ferenc Liszt International Airport (BUD)**, approximately 22 km from the venue.

- **Taxi:** The journey takes about **30–40 minutes**, depending on traffic.
- **Public Transport:** Take the **100E Airport Shuttle Bus** to **Kálvin tér**, then continue by **Metro Line M4** to **Móricz Zsigmond körtér**. From there, the venue is about an 8-minute walk. BKK operates Budapest's public transport network and offers convenient connections throughout the city.

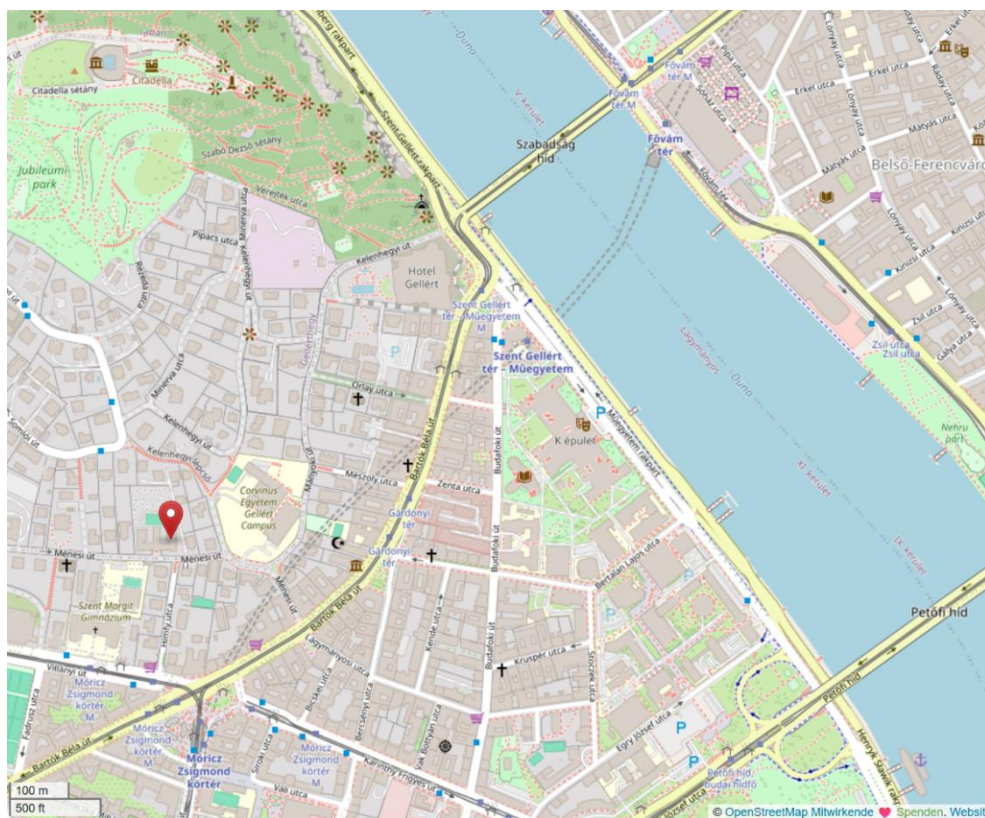
By Train

Budapest's main railway stations are well connected to the public transport network.

- **From Kelenföld Railway Station:** Take **Metro Line M4** to **Móricz Zsigmond körtér**, then walk approximately 8 minutes to the venue. This is the recommended route by ELTE.
- **From Keleti Railway Station:** Take **Metro Line M4** to **Móricz Zsigmond körtér**, then walk approximately 8 minutes to the venue.
- **From Nyugati Railway Station:** Take **Metro M3** to **Kálvin tér**, change to **Metro M4**, and continue to **Móricz Zsigmond körtér**.

By Car

The venue is in the Újbuda district (District XI of Budapest) and is easily reached via the M1, M7 and M0 motorways. Parking in the surrounding streets is limited and may be subject to parking fees. Public transport is recommended whenever possible.
